## "Memorial Day"

John 15:1 NRSV - "No one has greater love than this, to lay down one's life for one's friends."

As we celebrate this Memorial Day, it is hard to grasp the ultimate price for our freedom. With all the negative aspects of our country being forced down our throats on a daily basis it is easy to forget all that we have to be thankful for. We can voice our opinions, we can be a part of any religion, we have the freedom to choose any career we desire, we can choose our own spouse.... The list below are the conflicts with the 10 highest American casualties. Keep in mind that the number of soldiers wounded is about 5 times these numbers:

| Korean War                 | 1950–53      | 54,246  | 45             |
| American Revolutionary War | 1775–83      | 25,000  | 11             |
| War of 1812                | 1812–15      | 15,000  | 15             |
| Mexican–American War       | 1846–48      | 13,283  | 29             |
| Iraq War/Afghanistan Wars  | 2001-present | 6,717   | 1.57           |
| Philippine–American War    | 1899–1902    | 4,196   | 3.8            |
